Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make good progress and achieve high attainment across all subject areas. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including progress for those who are already high attainers.

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We will consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who have a social worker and young carers. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Our approach will be responsive to common challenges and individual needs, rooted in robust diagnostic assessment, not assumptions about the impact of disadvantage. The approaches we have adopted complement each other to help pupils excel. To ensure they are effective we will:

- ensure disadvantaged pupils are challenged in the work that they're set
- act early to intervene at the point need is identified
- adopt a whole school approach in which all staff take responsibility for disadvantaged pupils' outcomes and raise expectations of what they can achieve

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils indicate under-developed oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among many disadvantaged pupils. These are evident from Reception through to KS2.
2	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils suggest disadvantaged pupils generally have greater difficulties with phonics than their peers. This negatively impacts their development as readers. In 2023/24, 70% of all pupils reached the expected standard in the end of Year 1 Phonics Screen, compared with 62.5% of disadvantaged pupils. 62.5% of all pupils met the expected standard in reading at the end of KS1, compared with 61.5% of disadvantaged pupils. 67% of all pupils met the expected standard in reading at the end of KS2, compared with 66.7% of disadvantaged pupils. This shows an increase from 58.6% of disadvantaged pupils meeting the expected standard in reading at the end of KS2 in 2022/23.

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3	Internal and external assessments indicate that Maths attainment among disadvantaged pupils is significantly below that of all pupils. In 2023/24, 66.7% of all pupils met the expected standard in Maths at the end of KS1, compared with 53.8% of disadvantaged pupils. In 2023/24, 70% of all pupils met the expected standard in Maths at the end of KS2, compared with 61.9% of disadvantaged pupils. This shows an increase from 55.2% of disadvantaged pupils meeting the expected standard in Maths at the end of KS2 in 2022/23.
4	On entry to Reception class in September 2024 75% of our disadvantaged pupils arrived working below age-related expectations.
5	Our assessments (including wellbeing survey), observations and discussions with pupils and families have identified social and emotional issues for many pupils, notably anxiety, issues around friendships, low self-esteem and confidence as well as bereavement. These challenges particularly affect disadvantaged pupils, including their attainment.
6	<p>Our attendance data for 2023-2024 indicates that the difference between the attendance for disadvantaged pupils was 91.7% compared to 94.4% for non-disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>Our data also shows that the percentage of disadvantaged pupils who were 'persistently absent' was 22.58% compared to 19.5% amongst all pupils.</p>

Intended outcomes

This explains the outcomes we are aiming for **by the end of our current strategy plan**, and how we will measure whether they have been achieved.
